Board of Governors Meeting and Retreat

The Southern West Virginia Community and Technical College Board of Governors held its October meeting and annual retreat in Charleston, West Virginia, on October 19-20, 2006.

The Board reviewed Southern's Vision 2020 Plan and developed a draft plan for strategic goals and priorities. The Board will review the draft during its November meeting and adopt College priorities that

will be shared with the College as a whole.

The Board also granted approval for draft policies to be sent out for a 30-day comment period. The policies have been announced and circulated. Additionally, the Board amended the Program Review Schedule to allow the Division of Technology and Engineering to review all programs in the same academic year.

Board of Governors Vice Chair, Rory Perry, who has been on the Board since its inception, has tendered his resignation effective October 31, 2006 to Governor Manchin due to his recent retirement from Bank One—Logan and subsequent relocation to Huntington, WV. We are very sorry that he will be leaving the Board and wish him well with future endeavors.

Southern's Allied Health Programs Premier in the State

Southern West Virginia Community and Technical College has become the leader in allied health programs among two- and four-year colleges in West Virginia. Mrs. Pamela Alderman, Associate Vice President and Dean of Allied Health, has received final results of the 2006 graduates who took the national certification licensure and registry examinations. For the first time in the history of Southern's Division of Allied

Health, all students graduating from the A.A.S. programs received a 100% passage rate. This includes graduates from the Medical Laboratory Technology, Nursing, and Radiologic Technology programs. This is a tremendous success!!

Additionally, graduates of the EMT-B course achieved 100% passage on their national exam. Graduates from

the Medical Laboratory Assistant program again achieved 100% passage on their national certification exams as did the first graduates from the Electrocardiography program at the Wyoming Campus.

This is a phenomenal time in our history. I congratulate our allied health program coordinators, faculty, and support staff for making this happen.

- The National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences (NAACLS) conducted a site visit for continuing accreditation of the Medical Laboratory Technology (MLT) program on October 3-4, 2006 at the Logan Campus. The process was excellent and we anticipate receiving full re-accreditation. Final results of the accreditation visit will be provided to Southern in the spring.

- The West Virginia Council for Community and Technical College Education approved grant funds for Southern to initiate Cosmetology and Survey Technician programs.
- Southern officials attended the dedication ceremony for the new Lincoln County High School at Hamlin on October 19, 2006. Brigadier General Charles "Chuck" Yeager was the featured speaker.
